### **Upcoming Worship Series**

Signs of life: Clues for a future church Jan 15-Feb 19, 2023

It's easy to blame church problems on COVID. But many trends were impacting Christian churches a long time before the pandemic. Historian and theologian Phyllis Tickle describes it as "Every five hundred years, the Church cleans out its attic and has a giant rummage sale." Methods and programs that once nurtured faith in congregations no longer connected with many people, forms of worship seemed hollow, structures that once supported vital activities now suffocated people's souls. There were similar trends with Sunday night, prayer night, Sunday School, vacation bible school. Christian education taught guidelines but did not form believers who look like Jesus. Then COVID came and sped up the decline. Where is the Jesus movement heading? In this series we look at signs of life for clues and a church of the future.

**February 19 - Structure** Post-world war II gave rise to churches organized like institutions with administrative structures and significant overhead costs. Such maximalist structures drain vital energy away from congregational endeavors. What clues can we find for workable structures?

**February 22 - Ash Wednesday** (Church Family Meal, followed by a short observance with ashes as we begin the season of Lent.)

### February Refugee Support Team Update

The **Glushko** family is doing well. Bogdan (10) started school at Archbold a week ago. They have received their Social Security cards. Igor started working at Nofziger Door on Wednesday, February 15.

We are sponsoring a second Ukrainian family so that the two families can help and support each other as they adjust to living in a new land. The **Skopych** family, Andrii, Iryna, Maksim (11), and Veronika (4), arrived on February 14. The home they will live in is in Wauseon. We are hoping to enroll Maksim in Archbold school if transportation can be arranged. Use of the house in Wauseon is being donated for the next several months.

Andrii is a truck driver. He has an international license but will need to be licensed in Ohio. We are trying to find work for him.

A special giving opportunity will be available on February 19 to help support the refugee work. Details will follow.

# THE LAST PAGE...

#### ...but never the last word

Since this column was intended to be used by either of the pastors, I wanted to write this week about something that I cannot stop thinking about.

In the book of Revelation, we find some of the most beautiful images of worship in all of scripture. In one of them, John attempts to describe the majesty of what he's experienced in his vision. He encounters the door of heaven standing open, and when he is invited to look inside, he sees four rather strange-looking creatures surrounding the throne.

Day and night without ceasing they sing,

Holy, holy, holy

the Lord God the Almighty,

who was and is and is to come. (Rev 4:8, NRSV)

John paints a stirring picture of unending worship of the One who sits on the throne. The One who "is worthy to receive glory and honor and power, and who created all things..." (Rev 4:11, NRSV)

If you are on social media, or follow the news, you may have noticed videos or stories about what is being called a revival at Asbury University, a small United Methodist college in Wilmore, Kentucky. Chapel services are offered on Mondays, Wednesday, and Fridays each week, and students are expected to attend a certain number of these each semester. The chapel service on Wednesday, February 8th, by all appearances, seemed like a normal day. However, students who were present described a powerful movement of the Spirit that took place at the end of the service. As a result, this February 8th chapel has never officially ended! Some students, faculty, and staff have even chosen to remain in the chapel 24 hours a day, praying, singing, and giving praise to God. According to an NBC news story, students and staff from 22 other colleges have traveled to Asbury to participate. The university has also received word that some international students are making their way to Kentucky, eager to be a part of what God is doing. One article I read, written by a professor at nearby Asbury Seminary, described students running across campus to get to chapel because they couldn't wait to get back. Historically, great revival movements in the church have begun with the youth and young adults. I pray we would long to be in God's presence like these students! I pray we would lay down our own schedules and agendas when the Spirit moves, and let the winds blow. Where have you felt God moving in your life? What might the Spirit be saying to us as the gathered body at Zion? I invite you to be in prayer about that this week. As always, I also welcome your thoughts. Sue
