"Treasure in Clay Jars: A Series on Grief:" A full human life, even for Christians, includes both love and loss. Opening ourselves to the risk of love also means opening ourselves to the pain of loss. Some of us overestimate how "strong" we are until we are faced with hardship and loss, and we are forced to see our own mortality. Others of us consider ourselves too "fragile," and we are afraid to take risks because we might get hurt. Both are defenses to protect us from grief. Grief is hard and Jesus dwells within us. He is our "treasure" that we hold in the clay jar of our humanity. We don't have to be stronger than we are, or live stuck in fear of moving forward. Drawing on this image from 2 Corinthians 4:5-7, we'll explore the complicated human experience of grief during the month of September.

THE LAST PAGE...

...but never the last word

Our minds and bodies are wired for consistency. We like to make meaning out of patterns and connections. When we repeat tasks often, those tasks require less conscious attention and can be done "without even thinking." For example, driving home from work becomes automatic. This allows us to free up thinking for other things and we become more efficient.

When we need to go somewhere else for an errand on the way home, we have to consciously decide to go there. At least I hope I'm not the only one who gets home sometimes only to realize that I forgot to stop at the store! Consistency rules! This way that our brains function is usually helpful. And, it makes change difficult.

Change interrupts the usual way we've done things and then the new activity requires more effort. Our memory pathways "resist" the new. Feelings become part of the process, too. "The way we did it before was better," our feelings say. "This is hard! Why can't things just stay the way they were?" This is natural. Maybe you can think of times like that. Many changes are small, like driving to the grocery store.

And some are huge, like the death of a loved one. There are so many habits and deeply ingrained ways of relating to the person we love, and now those ways of relating are interrupted. Emotions get involved and we feel their absence in small and big things: going for a walk, sitting down to eat, asking for an opinion, sharing about the day, learning to do chores they did, wanting to settle that argument.

This loss of consistency impacts us with other changes: ending a job, going off to school, graduating, driving a different vehicle. Anything that interrupts those normal ways.

Beginning September 10, we will spend three weeks on this adaptation to change that we call grief. I've wanted to do this since last fall. Not because something is wrong - people at Zion have shown great ability to adapt to many changes large and small. But because sometimes in the ongoing movement of life, it's helpful to pause and breathe and take stock. We build community by connecting over such experiences of change. We recognize where "that" feeling has been coming from. We realize we are not alone. We increase our ability to care for one another. We grow in wisdom and faith. I am grateful we can do this together. ~ Dan
